Glossary of Terms



30 Most Frequently Used Door Hardware Terms.

Backset: The distance between the edge of the door and the center of the bore hole for the doorknob or latch.

Latch: A mechanical device that keeps the door closed until it is opened by turning the knob or lever.

Strike Plate: A metal plate affixed to the door jamb or frame, which the latch engages with when the door is closed.

Latch bolt: The part of the latch that extends or retracts when the door is closed or opened.

Deadbolt: A bolt that cannot be moved to the open position except by rotating the key or knob.

Doorknob: A rounded handle used for opening and closing a door.

Door Lever: A handle, often shaped like a lever, used for opening and closing a door.

Escutcheon: A decorative plate surrounding a keyhole or knob to protect the door surface.

Rosette: A decorative plate installed behind a knob or lever against the door surface.

Latch Mechanism: The internal mechanism within the knob or lever that operates the latch.

Latch Faceplate: A metal plate installed on the edge of the door that accommodates the latch mechanism.

Doorstop: A device attached to the door frame to prevent the door from swinging too far open and damaging the wall.

Hinge: A movable joint that connects the door to the door frame, allowing it to swing open and closed.

Hinge Pin: The cylindrical pin that holds the two halves of the hinge together.

Door Closer: A hydraulic device that controls the speed and force at which a door closes.

Door Sweep: A flexible strip attached to the bottom of the door to seal the gap between the door and the floor, preventing drafts and dust from entering.

Threshold: The horizontal piece of wood or metal at the bottom of a doorway, forming the entrance to a building.

Jamb: The vertical portion of the door frame where the door is hinged or latched.

Reinforcement Plate: A metal plate installed on the door or door frame to strengthen the area around the lock or latch.

Keyway: The slot or groove in a lock cylinder into which the key is inserted.

Privacy Lock: A lock that can be engaged to prevent entry from the outside, typically used on bathroom or bedroom doors.

Passage Set: A non-locking door set used for interior doors, allowing free passage without the need for a key.

Keyed Entry: A lockset that requires a key for entry from the outside, commonly used on exterior doors.

Latch Guard: A metal plate or shield installed around the latch area to prevent tampering or forced entry.

Latch Release: A mechanism that allows the latch to be released without turning the knob or lever, often used in emergency situations.

Flush Bolt: A type of bolt installed flush with the door edge, typically used on double doors to secure the inactive leaf.

Mortise Lock: A type of lockset installed within a mortise cutout in the door, providing greater security and durability.

Latch Bolt: The portion of the latch that extends or retracts when the door is closed or opened.

Strike Box: A reinforced metal box embedded into the door frame to receive the latch or deadbolt.

ADA Compliant: Door hardware that meets the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act for accessibility.
